History Detectives Traveling Trunk

Program Overview

This is a program that puts students in touch (literally) with history! Your kids step into a museum curator's shoes and explore what museum professionals do to preserve artifacts and uncover their stories. When explored in-depth, this program's use of primary sources, coupled with their research, utilizes critical thinking, problem-solving, previous knowledge, and decision-making skills.

Our History Detectives traveling trunks are designed to allow students the opportunity to handle 1910's - 1930's artifacts. In researching and learning about commonplace 1920's artifacts, the student compares and contrasts characteristics of the artifacts and what they represent in their own lives, communities, state, region, and the country. The student will discover how the artifacts relate to important and/or common people, concepts of the day, and the use of goods and services.

Students will work in small groups to examine their assigned item, research it and present their findings to you and their class. Teachers receive a brief, easy to follow guide to how to run the program with your students as well as a description of each item, its history, lead questions for teachers, useful links, and lesson expansion ideas.
